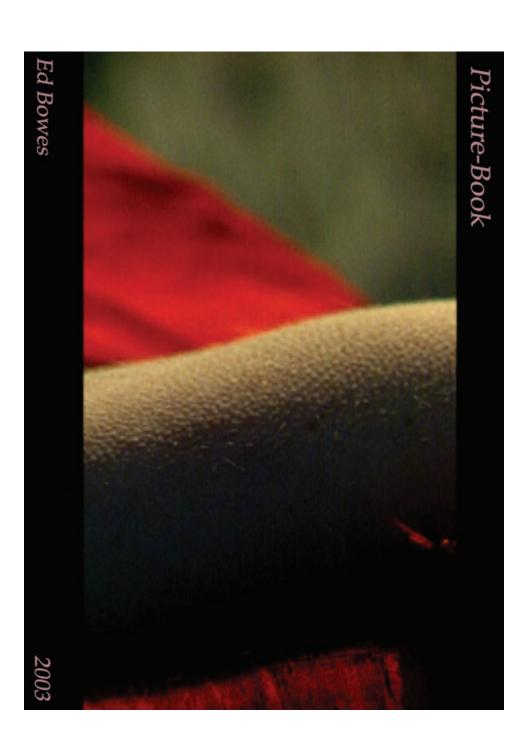

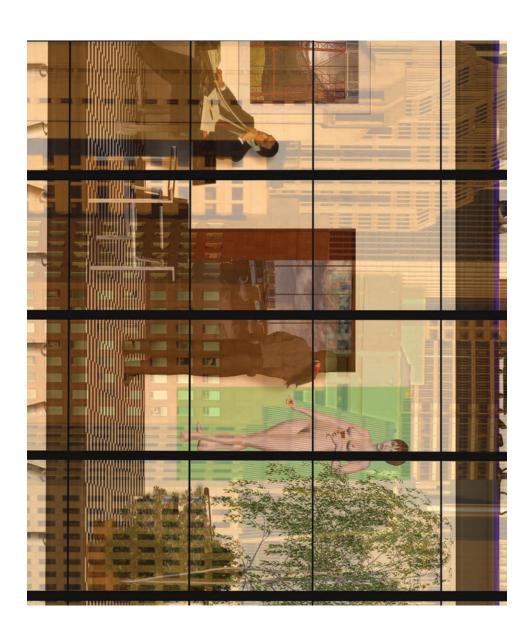

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've been teaching in this program since it started in 1988. At that time, I was writing about the Clarence H. White School of Photography, a small program established in 1914 in a townhouse off Union Square whose alumni included such diverse talents as Dorothea Lange, Paul Outerbridge, and Margaret Bourke-White. By teaching at SVA, I wanted to find out who in our time was coming to New York to study photography and why. Over the years, I have strived to adapt my teaching of photographic history to the needs of artists. The most effective approach, I have found, is to introduce students to the vast photographic collections of the city and to look at the history of photography through the lens of museum practice.
